

## RESOLUTION

Subject: Gun Violence Prevention – Support Legislation that Establishes a State-Wide Office of Gun Safety in Kentucky

Submitted by: Greater Louisville Medical Society

Referred to: Reference Committee

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WHEREAS, from 2022 to 2023, Kentucky has deteriorated from being the 15<sup>th</sup> highest to 14<sup>th</sup> highest state in the nation in firearm related deaths<sup>1</sup>; and

WHEREAS, from 2022 to 2023, guns are now the first leading cause of death in children (ages 1-17)<sup>2</sup>; and

WHEREAS, gun violence costs Kentucky \$9.6 billion each year (includes medical, work-loss, police and criminal justice, employer, and quality-of life costs)<sup>3</sup>, of which in 2023, the direct cost to Kentucky taxpayers of gun-related deaths and injuries was \$183.4 million<sup>2</sup>; and

WHEREAS, in an average year in Kentucky, 823 people die by guns<sup>4</sup>; and

WHEREAS, Kentucky has the 12<sup>th</sup> highest rate of gun suicides in the country<sup>4</sup>; and

WHEREAS in Kentucky, there is a gun suicide every 18 hours<sup>4</sup>; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that KMA supports legislation that establishes a state-wide Office of Gun Safety in Kentucky to reduce firearm-related deaths.
