STEPS is an acronym for "Screenings, Tobacco use, Exercise & Nutrition, Physician Visits, and Stress." The KMA, along with their member physicians, will focus on these five key areas emphasizing the importance of regular health screenings, eliminating tobacco use, prioritizing exercise and proper nutrition, scheduling routine physician visits, and managing stress.

Campaign Summary and Goals

According to the 2023 America's Health Rankings Annual Report, Kentuckians suffer from many health issues, clocking in at 41st in the country. Making many, or even a few, lifestyle changes at once to tackle these challenges can be overwhelming. The Kentucky Medical Association (KMA)'s "Small STEPS, Big Impact" campaign will address many of the issues outlined in the report by encouraging patients to achieve long-term success through taking simple steps that can add up to a big impact on their health. The campaign will focus on five key areas and offer straightforward strategies and support for patients. Physicians, as leaders of the care team, will be walking with patients as they take these steps and make changes together. Physicians will also be encouraged to have conversations with patients about overall health and wellness at each visit.



Screenings

2023 Kentucky Health Rankings 10th: Colorectal Cancer Screenings 2nd: Lung Cancer Screening**

Take advantage of health screenings you are eligible for. Examples of small STEPS may include:

- Schedule a colorectal cancer screening beginning at age 45.
- · Find out what lung cancer screenings you may be eligible for based on your tobacco-use history.



Tobacco

2023 Kentucky Health Rankings 46th: Tobacco Use

Eliminate tobacco use. Examples of small STEPS may include:

- Join a tobacco cessation support group.
- Use a journal to help gradually cut down on usage.
- Schedule an appointment with your primary care physician to discuss cessation plans and ask about lung cancer screenings.

Look for ways to add more movement and healthier foods

into your day. Examples of small STEPS may include:

Schedule a well-visit with your primary care physician and maintain all routine appointments with any specialists. Examples of small STEPS may include:

- Bring a list of any concerns to your appointments.
- Ask about what screenings you may be eligible for at each visit.
- Schedule follow up visits before leaving the office.

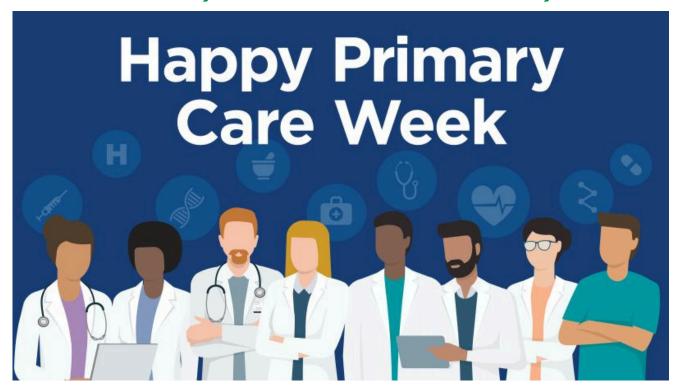

- Set an alarm or use an app to help decrease your screen time.
- Research mental health providers in your area on Google.
- Make sure you are getting adequate, quality sleep each night.
